

LETTER FROM CAROL

Dear Friends,

"I'm planning a camping holiday but, I have to say, I'm far from impressed with my travel insurance.

It turns out if someone steals my tent in the night, I'll no longer be covered."

Is it time to take a holiday? Well, I hope by the time you read this you may be on holiday or planning one, and we hope the British Summer will emerge!

All this points to the need for us all to take some time away, and do something a bit different, to give ourselves the space to laugh, relax, and restore our energies. Even having a daycation can restore the equilibrium and can help us feel happy, content and relaxed. So if you have just broken up from school, college, or have finally got that leave you booked months ago I hope you can enjoy.

I was once given a lovely little book as a leaving gift from one of my parishes. It is called **"Jesus' Day off" by Nicholas Allen**. That evening in his prayers God replied saying: "Look down there a minute, Son". So Jesus looked down.

"Where you did your cartwheels, fountains of water appeared in the desert...where you ate your picnic, the trees bloomed with fruit... when you went swimming, the fishermen had lots of luck...and whoever you passed on your donkey, felt instantly happy."

The moral of the story ends with the missive that if you feel better about yourself then you can make others feel better and happier too, which is a reminder to us all.

With new horizons upon us too, looking forward to a new term in September, a new parliament ready to really begin its work in earnest, the time away helps to prepare for the next challenges, and exciting new ventures.

We need to take care of ourselves in order to care for others. It is often true that the simplest things can make us happy. Taking the time away perhaps to enjoy your hobbies, or do something different, enjoy a good walk, time in the garden or park, get stuck into a good read, or relax, give time for ourselves and those we love, is so important for our well-being. Our faith can encourage reflection with time to pause, be still and pray. In this way the pace of life can sustain us, rather than having no time to breathe or recharge our batteries.



We pray for people buried under bombed-out buildings and the victims of earthquakes, fires and mining accidents.


We pray for those with smoke in their nostrils and dust in their mouths, lost and perhaps unremembered.

An update on Finances at St. Mary's

July 2024

I have just "balanced the books" and reconciled the bank balance in my records with the monthly statement, as I do each time I get a statement.

The current deficit, as of 30th June, is running at approximately £7K. It is not unusual for us to be running a deficit at the halfway mark, but this is higher than usual. Our overall income is similar to last year, but it is our costs, mainly utilities and maintenance which have been rising despite careful management.

We have set in motion a rise in rents from both halls, but it is our personal income that needs addressing.

We all, or most of us, need to consider an increase in what we give. The most effective way to give is regularly through PGS (Parish Giving Scheme). My personal income is received monthly, so I give monthly and can also choose to have the amount increased on an annual basis to reflect the rate of inflation. (This is an optional choice and not mandatory to that scheme). PGS also collect the Gift Aid Tax and pay that to the church monthly as well.

Those of you who give through the Free Will Offering Scheme have the Gift Aid Tax collected by myself quarterly, but I don't have the power or authority to increase the amount for you! If only.

Please consider an increase this year, especially if, like quite a few of you, haven't done so for many years.

If you do not give regularly, WHY NOT? I ask you to do so and it is very simple.

Ask me for a PGS form or go online <u>www.parishgiving.org.uk</u> our parish name is West Wickham St Mary and PGS Code 370637377. or telephone PGS on 0333 002 1271. My dream for a very long time is that ALL those who profess to be members of St Mary's be in either the PGS or FWO Scheme, preferably the former. We are not there yet.


If so, please consider leaving a legacy to St. Mary's.


