LETTER FROM CAROL

Dear Friends,

During December and January, the darkest times of the year, we celebrate "Light", and we look for renewed hope for the future in a New Year. The Christmas Gospel proclaims that "The Light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it" (John 1: 5) To take our thoughts further I would like to ask you if you have a special hope or dream for the future and if so what would that dream be like?

Jesus Christ was a gift to all people regardless of sex, creed or social background. How have we received this gift in our world? In John's Gospel we are reminded "that the world did not know him" (John 1:10) and in that famous Christmas Carol, "O Little Town of Bethlehem," we sing in verse 3, "No ear may hear his coming.... in this world of sin" So maybe we haven't done too well at receiving the greatest gift into our lives. We certainly live in a world full of conflict, unrest, financial insecurity, war, prejudice, discrimination, intolerance, and misunderstandings. The church is not exempt from these things, but grounded in Faith, Hope and Love it does try to work through the difficulties it faces.

In that same Gospel reading it says, "The word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1: 14) You may well hear these words read if you attend the Carol services in any of our churches or indeed Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve. But why "The Word"? Well, we need to go back to a little Greek bearing in mind that the gospels were originally written in Greek! "The Word" is "Logos" in Greek, and in the ancient Greek world it also meant Reason. So, it means the reason and mind of God. Philo (a renowned Jew who lived in Alexandria) had studied the scriptures in depth and had come to the conclusion that the Logos was the oldest thing in the world and the instrument by which God had made the world - the thought of God stamped on the universe.

So, in this little phrase we have the Logos – the thoughts, dreams and mind of God becoming a person of flesh and blood. In Jesus Christ, this

creating, illuminating, sustaining mind of God has come to earth. Jesus is the greatest gift to us from God.

And there is a place for us all in his stable so let us renew our hope of the Christmas Dream of a future with Christ being born into our hearts this Christmastide.

For reflection I share with you words from a Modern Christmas Carol:

A CHRISTMAS DREAM

Somewhere on the far horizon fires were lit and songs were sung. In the bright glow hands were praying waiting for the day to come. Everyone was on that hilltop, Young and old had parts to play -Living out the Christmas Story brought to us on Christmas Day.

We left home and went to join them, Reached the hilltop saw the scene -

People of all race and colour - Living out the Christmas Dream.

In my dream the world was peaceful In my dream that night, Everyone came out and saw the light All the world was peaceful that night.

Somewhere on the far horizon Fires alight in eyes that gleam People join their hands together - Living out the Christmas Dream.

A time of love and a time of peace A time to pray for all hate to cease. A time to give, a time to understand All of the strength you hold in your hand.



Christmas Tree Festivals have become increasingly popular as a way of bringing communities together, raising money for charity, helping the


local economy, sharing the joy of Christmas and having a lot of fun!



PARISH MATTERS

Administration of Communion from December 1st Advent Sunday

In both churches St Mary's and St Francis', we will be resuming receiving Communion with the Common Cup.

Since 2020 and the Covid outbreak, we have all experienced many restrictions in our worship



pattern, but with the provision of vaccines and increased awareness the Church of England directive has been that churches resume with their normal practice before the pandemic. When our Archdeacon Greg Prior visited earlier in the year, he was surprised that we had not already re-introduced the Common Cup, and it is the Bishop's wish that we should do so.

At the last supper Jesus "took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it and gave it to them and said, 'Take, this is my body. 'Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, and all of them drank from it" (Mark 14: 22-23) It is our understanding of the sharing of the first cup of wine with Jesus and his disciples that has influenced our history, doctrine and teaching of the Church of England that the one cup is offered to every communicant.

This means that it will no longer be possible to have the option of an "Intinct" (Dipped) wafer. It is also not possible for individuals to intinct their wafer themselves. If you do not wish to share the common cup it is perfectly permissible to receive in one kind only. For those still concerned there is scientific evidence that shows that silver has a very low risk to transfer virus or infections because of its antibacterial qualities. Furthermore, there was no evidence that linked the covid outbreak with the sharing of the common cup for communion, far higher risks for the spread of the virus were airborne contact, not keeping social distancing and physical hand contact. But we should all be sensitive to one another and respectful as we would in the home

or workplace, if we are feeling unwell it is better to receive in one kind only.

In Tribute to Geoff – Saturday 5th October

Along with others of our Benefice, I attended Trinity House, Southwark, to sit on a review entitled "Sing with the Spirit and understanding" with a subtitle "how and what hymns do you choose to enrich and support worship."

This course was led by our own Venerable Carol Coslett, with an indepth enlightenment on the subject, by our Director of Music, Geoff Mussard, who undeniably is a keen past master on this subject of enhancing for our benefit, well-chosen supportive music for our church services.

The net result of attending this course was to really appreciate and realise how blessed we all are, that over the years, decades, we have been witnesses and students of this remarkable craft of knitting together, an order of service, illustrative hymns and reflective sermons.

We must congratulate Geoff on his depth of music scholarship and in his teaching us new hymns he has introduced over the years.

Our Benefice owes a great deal to our Organist and Choirmaster, and we all thank him for his dedication, which we all appreciate, knowing we are in the company of an outstanding musician and churchman.

The Food Bank



Give us through the coming year quietness of mind, teach up to be patient and always to be kind.


Give us reassurance when everything goes wrong, so our faith remains unfaltering and our hope and courage strong.

Another activity was for the children to draw or use collage skills to fill a paper plate with their favourite foods. Merri had lent us a section of honeycomb made by a swarm of bees in her garden, so we made bees with flapping wings. There was honey on bread to taste for those who wished - this became a very sticky activity, supervised by Kay and Geoff. Ken, together with Phillip Freeman, took the children outdoors with magnifying glasses to look carefully at the fruits of the church garden and to discover things which birds and animals could eat. Margaret supervised the making of fruit kebabs, fruit was carefully chosen and arranged before being quickly demolished at tea-time. The meal was our ever-popular pasta with sauce and cheese. This month's chefs, Annette and Cheryl (it was Beryl's month off) worked incredibly hard and judged the portions to perfection! The celebration in Church is such an important part of what we do. Richard showed us his wonderful pictures of mis-shaped vegetables and fruit and linked all the children's activities to his excellent presentation. Some of the children are too young to understand the full meaning behind everything we say or do, but they are all learning that church is where we celebrate God's wonderful world and that every one of us must look after all that God has given us.

In August there was a picnic on the grass in the church garden where games were played, the giant parachute was used, and there was plenty of time to chat and enjoy ourselves.

In November the theme was Remembrance and in December we will make decorations for a Messy Church Christmas Tree which will be part of the Christmas Tree Festival at St. Francis' Church.

Prayers have been answered. Messy Church is flourishing and growing. Now we are praying that a few more people will be able to come and join us as helpers. We have fewer helpers and more children at the moment, and we are finding it difficult to have enough time to talk with the families as we are all so busy.

If you are at all interested in joining in the Friday fun each month, please have a word with Kay or with any of the people mentioned in this description of October's Messy Church.

We meet to set things up from 2.30pm, the families come from 3.45pm and we leave the hall clean and tidy by 5.45pm. The busy period is between 3.30 and 5.30 and that is when we need you most!

Letter from The Rt Revd Christopher Chessun The Bishop of Southwark

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Many of you will have either read the Makin Report – an independent review into the Church of England's handling of allegations of abuse by John Smyth - or seen the news coverage.

The report details many failings over a number of decades that likely led to John Smyth's abuse of boys and young men across two continents continuing when it might have been stopped. It is a deeply distressing read – but also an important one. If you are engaging with it, I would urge you to go gently and ensure that you are accessing whatever support you may need. Please also be aware that the publication of the report and widespread news coverage is likely to be having an impact on survivors of abuse, who may be struggling – if you are supporting people affected by issues such as those detailed in the report, please take extra care to check in with them and offer support. A full list of organisations that can help is available here.

Following last week's publication of the report, there has been much public discussion around the particular responsibilities and accountability of those named in the report. It is with deep sadness that I heard the news yesterday of Archbishop Justin's resignation. The Archbishop has my respect for the integrity of this decision – please do pray for him, his family and for all the staff at Lambeth Palace as well as for our Church at this challenging time. I remain deeply grateful for the support and encouragement of Archbishop Justin - both personally and on behalf of the Diocese in which he has taken a close interest, living in our midst when not in Canterbury.

In the midst of this, it is absolutely crucial that we do not lose sight of our own responsibilities. It is imperative that we do not miss the opportunity to learn the lessons of this review – especially with regard to diligence in reporting, care for survivors and the need to continually reflect on and review our culture and practices. It is rightly said that Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility – but as church officers and ministers, we bear a particular duty to ensure this responsibility is taken seriously.

Many will find the full report too complex or upsetting to read in detail – that is understandable. However, I would encourage all those who are able to engage with it to read and reflect on Part 4 of the report – Learning themes and recommendations. This sets out the key learnings from the Review, which I believe are important for all of us.

For those wondering how to respond to the Review in the short term, I offer the following as practical steps that can be taken without delay:

First and foremost, please pray for all victims and survivors of abuse. We do not need to know who they are or what they have suffered to do this – we simply need to lift them before God in prayer.

This Sunday (17 November) is Safeguarding Sunday – an opportunity to highlight the importance of Safeguarding, repent of our failings and give thanks for the good work that continues to be done. Resources are available here.

How easy is it for people in your congregation to access safeguarding support and advice? Please check that parish and diocesan contacts are clearly signposted, both within your church building and on your website.

Safeguarding should be part of our regular conversations. Please ensure that it is a regular item on your PCC agenda and with your leadership teams. It would be helpful for your PCC to discuss the recommendations of the Makin report – and how those might be implemented locally.

Check that safeguarding training is up-to-date for those in positions of responsibility in your parish. Your Parish Safeguarding Officer will be able to do this – information about Safeguarding training can be found online here.

If you need any safeguarding support or advice, please don't hesitate to contact the diocesan Safeguarding team – details here.

I am enormously grateful to each one of you for your share in this crucial work, which is at the heart of our calling as disciples of Christ. In the face of these challenges, it can be tempting to despair, but God remains faithful, even where we have failed.

As we approach the season of Advent, we are reminded that 'the light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it' (John 1:4). When we commit ourselves to shine a light on the darkness of this world and the failings of our own Church, when we are willing to face the hard realities, we can be confident that God is with us and will make a way for justice, mercy and peace to overcome.

There is so much to do!


Then comes the day, the kitchen fills With wondrous cooking smells, As turkey roasts and parsnip toasts The cooks must work their spells.


