

Letter from Richard

Dear Friends,

February sees the feast day of someone who is probably the most popular of all saints, certainly as far as the secular world is concerned: St Valentine. For such a popular saint, not a great deal is really known about him, although he is the subject of a number of legends. I say "he," but there are at least two saints answering to the name: St Valentine of Rome and St Valentine of Terni.

Whilst Catholic and Protestant churches celebrate Valentine on February 14th, in the Eastern Orthodox Church his day is July 6th. And to complicate matters further, the Eastern Orthodox Church also celebrates the feast of the second Valentine, the Bishop of Interamna, now known as Terni, a town in Italy, on July 30th, although in his hometown and elsewhere it is February 14th.

The most common version of events that led to Valentine becoming the patron saint of lovers runs as follows. Valentine was a priest or bishop living in Rome. The emperor at the time, Claudius II, had outlawed weddings as young men were using marriage as an excuse for not joining the army and existing soldiers were getting married in order to get out, with disastrous results for recruitment numbers.

However, Valentine began to marry couples secretly, but when this was found out, Claudius had him thrown in jail. Valentine used his time in jail to reach out to people with the love that he found in Jesus. His jailer, Asterious, was so impressed with Valentine's teaching and wisdom, that as well as having all his household baptised, he also asked him to teach his daughter, Julia, who was blind. At the same time, Emperor Claudius, having heard of his wisdom, offered Valentine his freedom if he would give up his faith and worship the Roman deities. Valentine not only refused but also tried to convert Claudius to Christianity.

This so enraged Claudius that he ordered Valentine's execution. On the night before he died tradition has it that Valentine sent Julia a note encouraging her to remain faithful to Jesus and signed it "From your Valentine." Some versions of the story also claim that God miraculously restored Julia's sight, so that she could read this note for herself.

It is generally agreed that Valentine was beaten, stoned, and beheaded on February 14, 269 AD.

So, what does this story have to say to us? Even if we strip away much of what might be regarded as legend, we are left with the story of a man whose faith was so important to him that he was prepared to die rather than give it up. We in this country are blessed that we can practise our Christianity without risking our lives or livelihoods, but that's not the case in countries like Iran, Iraq, North Korea, China, Pakistan, India and elsewhere. Let's keep these fellow Christians in our prayers.

Secondly, Valentine's story reinforces the importance of marriage in the eyes of the Church. Moreover, Asterious' desire to have his daughter educated stands out in contrast to those regimes today, such as Afghanistan, where girls are being denied an education beyond the primary stage. Again, a subject for prayer.

And finally, let's not forget Valentine's Day, with the humble Valentine card as one way, but not the only one, of showing those close to us just how much they mean to us.

Midnight Communion and our joint Christmas morning service provided regular church attenders, and those who rarely come, the opportunity to celebrate Christmas together.


Christmas Services at St Mary's



HOW TO

What do Lay Ministers do?

There are three types of lay ministry in the Diocese of Southwark:

Licensed: People recommended by the parish, selected and trained by the diocese. Their ministry is nationally recognised and transferable to another diocese should they move.

Commissioned: People recommended by the parish and selected and trained by the diocese. Their ministries are recognised across the whole diocese should they move parishes, and increasingly in other dioceses too.

Affirmed: People selected and trained within the local context, which is usually the parish. Affirmation is about publicly acknowledging and blessing the ministries people undertake within the parish – for example as communion assistants, welcomers, Sunday School leaders, or as part of a pastoral team. The diocese has also produced a resource, *Affirmed Ministry Training*, which provides details on affirmed ministry and suggestions for training.

There are so many different expressions of lay ministry. Some people serve in more traditional roles, such as Reader – someone who preaches and helps to lead worship at their church, as well as undertaking some pastoral work.

Then there are Commissioned Pastoral Lay Ministers (CPLMs) – formerly known as Southwark Pastoral Auxiliaries (SPAs). CPLMs work together with others in their congregation to offer care and support for those around them. Some give their time to local care home for the elderly or to assist hospital chaplains. Others help to lead the pastoral team in their church. The opportunities are many.

We also have three Licensed Pastoral Lay Ministers (LPLMs) who offer pastoral support to as well as preaching and helping to lead services. Wendy Stephens, our Diocesan Lead for Pastoral Ministry, is a prison chaplain. We are really hoping to add to the number of LPLMs in the near future, so do be in contact with the team if you are interested in this. There is so much to be done.

There are also Commissioned and Licensed Pioneer Ministers who work in the community with those who are not traditional church-goers and with church communities where English is not their first language.

We very much want more people to join those who are working as affirmed, Commissioned and Licensed Lay Ministers in the diocese and to celebrate all those who are already working as lay ministers.


