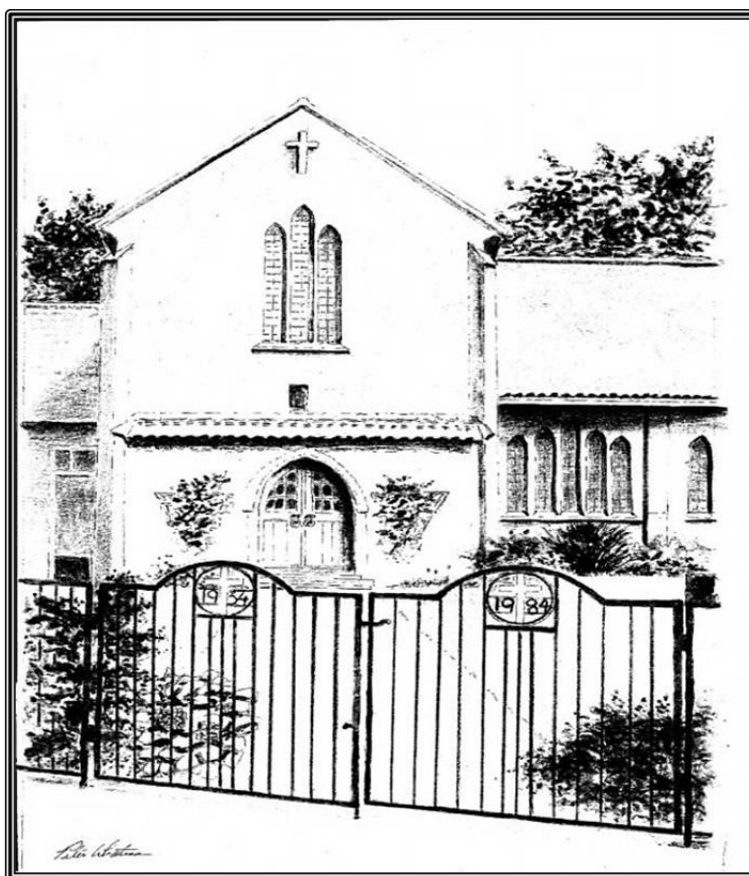

Letter from Richard

Dear Friends,

Change” is very much the word of the moment, certainly in political circles. And it may be that many of those demanding change politically in, say, increasing the number of affordable houses being built, are also reluctant to face changes in their own lives when there is a suggestion that some of the new houses be built in their own vicinity.

The Feast of Pentecost, or Whitsun, as it used to be called (a word derived from the early church custom that those who had been baptised at Easter wore white robes at Pentecost, giving rise to the term “White Sunday”) certainly embodies change. We’re told in “Acts” that before Jesus finally left his disciples, he told them that they were to remain in Jerusalem “and wait for the gift my father promised, which you have heard me speak about... the Holy Spirit.”

“Wait,” that’s a word that we can identify with as we anticipate the arrival of our new vicar, Matt Drummond. By the time he arrives, we’ll have been waiting for over a year, although it’s only since his appointment was announced that the expectation has really begun to build.

And expectation, excitement but also apprehension, must have been what those disciples were experiencing in those days between Jesus’ departure and Pentecost. And when they received the gift of the Holy Spirit, what a difference, what a change it made! We’re told that there were about 120 of Jesus followers gathered together on that day (Acts 1. 15, 2.1), but by the time that Peter, inspired by the Holy Spirit, had finished addressing the crowd, “about three thousand were added to their number.” Some change.

But that, as we know, was only the beginning of the story. From that small group of disciples, who only a few weeks before had been hiding behind locked doors “for fear of the Jews” (John 20.19), grew a movement and a faith that now

includes a third of the world's population and which is still growing. Some change! And a change of which we are the beneficiaries.

And now we in our two churches are once again having to face up to change, as we have to every time there is a change of vicar.

Some of you may be familiar with the fable entitled "Who moved my cheese?" a book written by Spenser Johnson.

Two mice and two "littlepeople" — people the size of mice — live in a maze. The mice are simpleminded and instinctive; they run the same path every day, eating cheese when they find it, but are always ready to move on. The littlepeople, Hem and Haw, search for a special kind of Cheese that always makes them happy. All four discover a spot where their favourite cheese is regularly available, called Cheese Station C. The mice continue to run the entire maze each day while the littlepeople stop exploring and settle at Cheese Station C.

One day the supply at Cheese Station C is exhausted. The mice accept that there is no more cheese and continue their running path. The littlepeople sit at the station confused and upset. Hem protests that there ought to be Cheese, and Haw wonders where the mice have gone. Meanwhile, the mice find a new supply of Cheese at Cheese Station N. The littlepeople remain at Cheese Station C for several days, growing frustrated and hungry. Eventually Haw accepts that running the maze is the only way he will ever have Cheese again, faces his fear of moving on, and leaves Hem behind.

Haw finds crumbs of Cheese scattered around the maze and some other Cheese Stations that are already depleted. He returns to Cheese Station C and tells Hem there is other Cheese, but Hem refuses to budge. Haw continues exploring until he arrives at Cheese Station N which is stocked with all kinds of Cheese.

I'm sure that you get the picture... and the challenge, in relation to possible change, as to whether you are a Hem or a Haw!

Our Incoming Vicar

I am writing to introduce myself. My name is Revd. Matthew Drummond (though everyone knows me as 'Matt') and I will be joining you in a few months as your new Vicar. I am not however entirely new to the area, having lived in Addiscombe between 1990-2005, and having served as a Curate in the Deanery at St Mary's Addington (2018-19).



Prior to Ordination (in 2014) I worked for the Foreign Office in London as a homebased Civil Servant. In the twelve years I worked there, the furthest I travelled were on overnight visits to Bradford, and Brussels (Bradford was by far the more eventful trip of the two!). Prior to this, I worked for a time as a shop assistant in Croydon's Whitgift Centre.

Since 2019, I have been serving as a Team Vicar in Thurrock in the Chelmsford Diocese, first at St Stephen's Purfleet where (due to a fluke of literature) I was Dracula's Vicar (Carfax Abbey, Dracula's London residence was placed by Bram Stoker on the sight of St Stephen's Church in Purfleet.) Since Covid I have been Team Vicar of two churches in Belhus Park and South Ockendon. The focus of my work since the Pandemic has been connecting the two churches I serve more deeply into the life of the community.

I come with a partner Tabitha, a supply teacher and singer who lives in South London, and a small friendly but bossy Scottie dog called Izzy.

I am looking forward to joining you soon and getting to know you all and the community better. In preparation, please be assured of my prayers, and please do pray for me.

We pray for all who witness to your presence, all who declare your love, All who declare your glory in their lives, All who go out in mission.

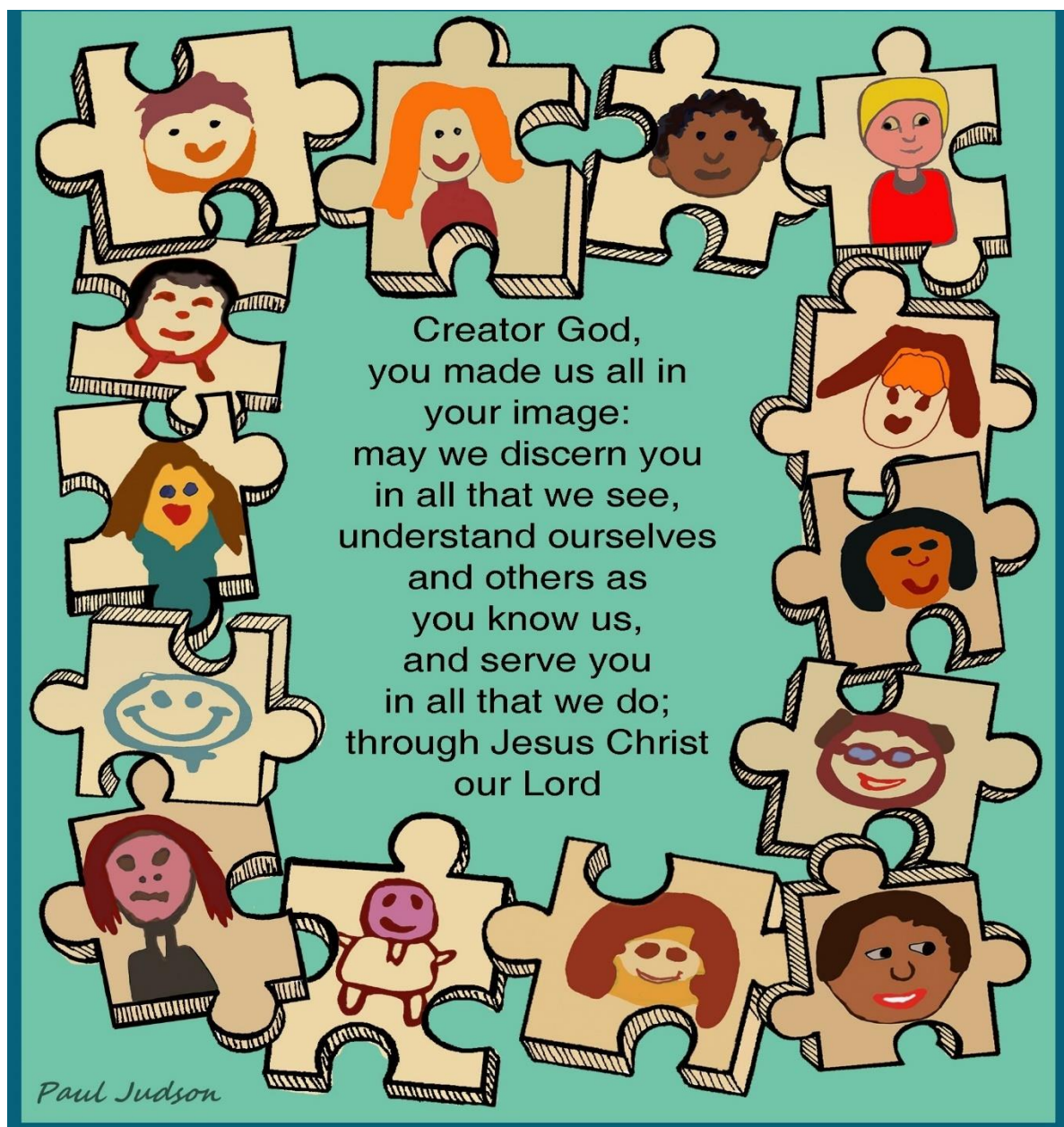
We pray that all Christians may remain strong in their faith.

We have been privileged to know Cheryl and may she rest in peace with her maker.

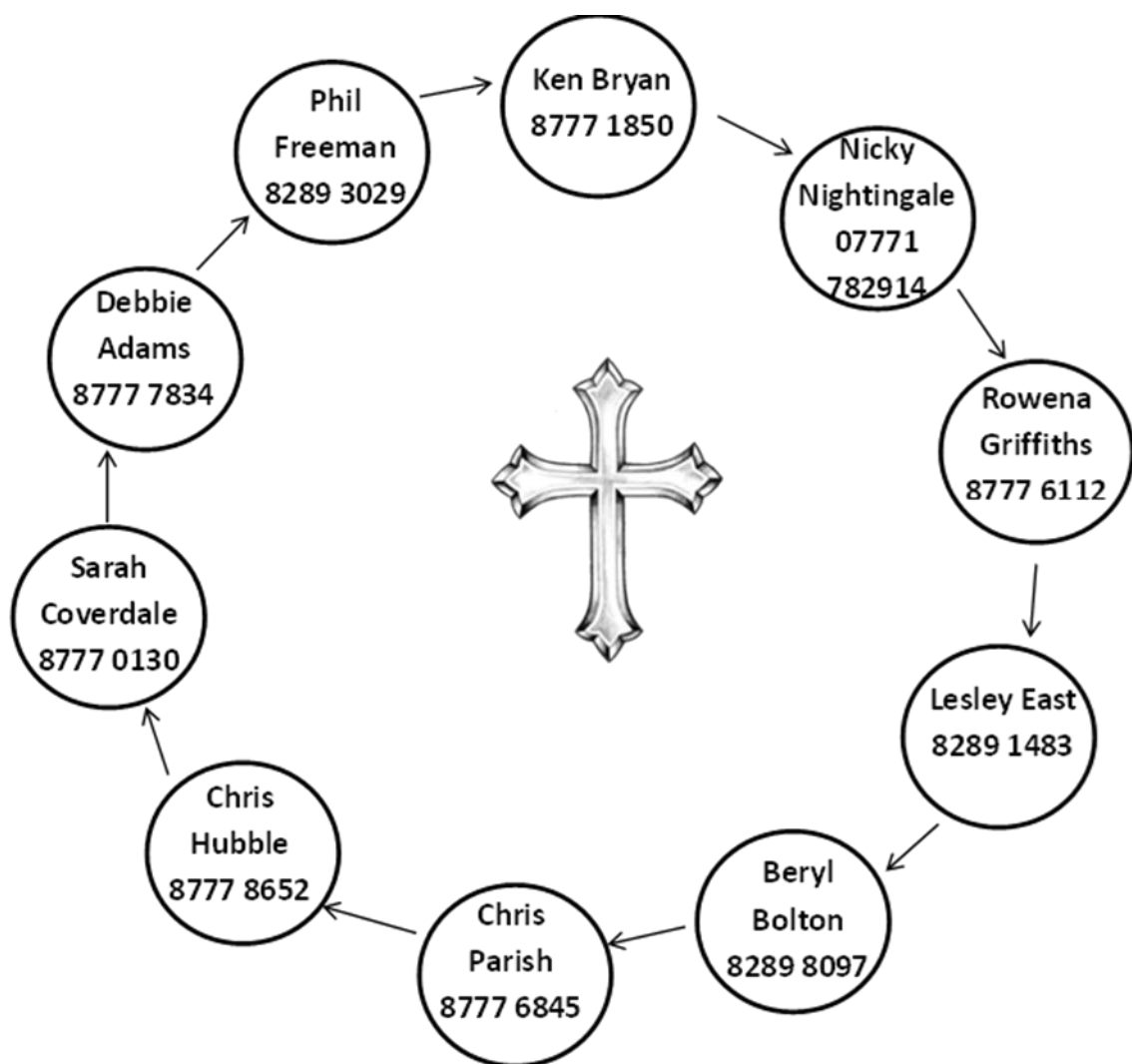

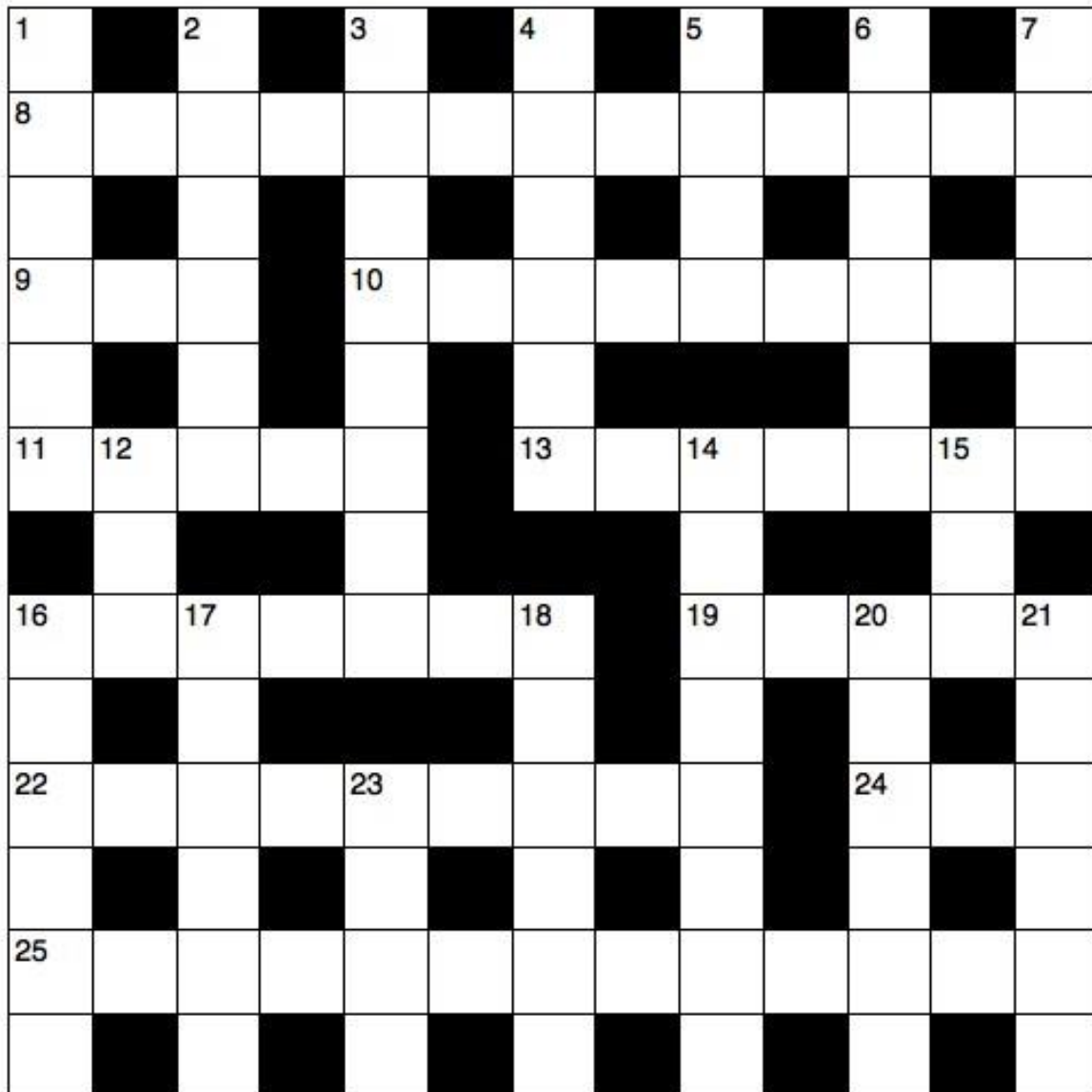

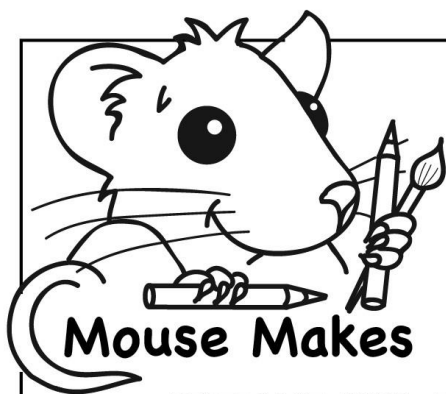
