

## LETTER FROM RICHARD

Dear All,

I'm writing this in mid-May, during the first really warm spell of the year, and, of course, people are, as usual, saying, "Better make the most of it. It may be all we get." But if previous years are anything to go by, the chances are high that we'll get at least one extreme heatwave, and that may have already happened by the time that you read this article.

Just yesterday, the headline in my daily paper read, "Scientists despair amid forecast of at least 2.5C temperature rise." The scientists in question belong to the highly respected Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), and many of them "envisage a 'semi-dystopian' future, with famines, conflicts and mass migration driven by heatwaves, wildfires, floods and storms of intensity far beyond those already struck."

Positively, the majority of people now recognise the need to take climate change seriously and implement measures to reduce global warming. The problem is that this is likely to come at a cost, and that's when people start complaining. It's been interesting seeing the responses on the "Next Door" social media site to Sadiq Khan's re-election as London Mayor, where his introduction of the Ultra Low Emission Zone has made him, in the eyes of many people, Public Enemy Number One. Now I fully understand that this measure has caused real problems for many less well-off people, but it has also led to the scrapping of many highly polluting vehicles, which must be a good thing. And it's a sad fact that those most badly affected by climate change live in some of the poorest countries. The problem is that there are always reasons to object to steps taken to reduce the damage being done to the environment by global warming. Ending the use of fossil fuels will hit the pockets of the shareholders in petroleum companies. Establishing wind farms spoils the view of those in the vicinity. And so on ... and the world keeps getting hotter!

In Psalm 8, the writer says of human beings that God has made them "a little lower" than himself and goes on:

- 6 You have given them dominion over the works of your hands; you have put all things under their feet,
- 7 all sheep and oxen, and also the beasts of the field,
- 8 the birds of the air, and the fish of the sea, whatever passes along the paths of the seas.

As Christians, we are called to be stewards of this wonderful creation that God has given us and take a lead in endorsing activities that will impact positively on global warming, including supporting the members of the IPCC in putting pressure on our politicians to take the steps necessary to ensure that the world that we leave to our children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren is not one that is burning up.

There is hope: as one scientist put it, "I really don't know what needs to happen for the people that have all the power and all the money to make the change. But then I see the younger generations fighting and I get a bit of hope again." (Ruth Ceroza Mota, Climate Scientist, National Autonomous University of Mexico)

As Christians we believe that God is ultimately in charge. There is, then, much to think about, pray about and take action about. As Teresa of Avila wrote:

Christ has no body but yours,
No hands, no feet on earth but yours,
Yours are the eyes with which he looks
Compassion on this world,
Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good,
Yours are the hands, with which he blesses all the world.

## St Francis and St Mary's Women's Group

Rather than meeting at one of our Churches in April we ventured further afield and went to St Paul's Cathedral to hear Rev Kate Bottley speak. Kate Bottley is a vicar, journalist and radio presenter. She presents Good Morning Sunday on BBC Radio 2 and is a regular presenter on BBC1's Songs of Praise. Her first book is Have a Little Faith: Life Lessons on Love, Death and How Lasagne Always Helps (Penguin 2023).

She talked about what faith means to her, that it's not all-or-nothing, and also some of the things she's learnt about life's big questions about love, death, forgiveness, loneliness and joy, and why she thinks, ultimately, faith is the key to happiness. She told us that faith is about hope, being human, having doubts, getting through life's hard bits, celebrating the great bits, and finding meaning and connection in it all.

St Paul's was very impressive as usual though the acoustics were a bit challenging. Kate is a very engaging speaker with great communication skills so listening to her talking about her faith journey was both thought provoking and a pleasure.

To quote from an interview she gave to 'Woman Alive' last year; 'When you become a Christian, it's not a destination you arrive at, it's a process that you go through continually'.

### **Interregnum Update from the Churchwardens**

The PCCs of St Mary's and St Francis met with the Archdeacon Greg Prior to discuss the process of appointing a new Vicar for the United Benefice of St Mary's and St Francis.

The initial steps will be reflecting on our Mission Action Plans and convening our Section 11 meetings to draw up our Parish profiles and appoint two representatives from each Church to sit on the interview panel.

The profile needs to reflect our work as individual Churches but also as a United Benefice and needs to be approved by both PCCs. Once the profile has been agreed by the Archdeacon and the Bishop, we can then start advertising the post, shortlisting applicants, and interviewing. The successful applicant would then have to give three months' notice to their current Parish.

It is envisaged that the process will take several months, and it is not possible to shorten the recruitment time. The interregnum allows us to adjust to Hazel's departure. It also gives us time to think about our future direction and pray for God's guidance in our search for a new vicar.

Your thoughts on the desired attributes of the new vicar would be welcome as well as what you think our churches strengths and weaknesses are. 



As many of you will know, our two churches have a link with St Andrew's Church in Gweru, Zimbabwe. They now have a new parish priest, Revd Tinashe Mahwerera, who has written, in response to my earlier email, to introduce himself and to update us on what is happening in his church.

"Dear Richard Ford (Revd.)

Greetings in the Name of our Risen Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Indeed am grateful to receive an email from you. Praise be to God. Before we came to St Andrews, we were at a Parish in Shurugwi called St



Athanasius. We arrived at St Andrews Anglican Church last year in January. Am married to Mildred and we are blessed with our son, Bradley.

We thank God for the Parish of St Andrews, and we believe we are growing spiritually and even in numbers in all the Guilds. This month of April is a month for conferences for all the guilds and we are happy that we are attending.

Our 2024 Theme is from 2 Corinthians 5 verse 7. We have started building a parsonage (Rector's house) and it is now at ring beam level. We are trying to raise money for the roof, window frames, doorframes and

plumbing equipment.



Currently am staying in Ascot, which is a location about 12 km from the church. So we do commute to church for services and pastoral work. The building under construction is in the church premises.

We do fundraisings to fund some of these projects but generally the economy is depressed and therefore affect church incomes. We have a tuck shop which is owned by the church and a means of fundraising. Currently its temporarily closed after we experienced a burglary and lost most of the goods which were on sale.

We do have a borehole at the church which is also assisting the community very much. Mkoba has challenges in provision of clean water.

So the borehole is assisting most neighbourhoods to get clean water for drinking. The church we believe should be there to meet the needs of people in communities and we feel this is also a way of evangelizing societies.


Our church choir recently launched a new gospel music album which has our theme as the album title. This is a first of its kind at St Andrews and
