

LETTER FROM HAZEL

Dear friends,

In our September Messy Church, we did some activities connected with the passage about Jesus healing Blind Bartimaeus (Mark 10:46-52). On the surface the story appears to be about physical blindness and healing, but a deeper look reveals it to be a story of God's compassion and mercy, which helps us to see people and things differently and experience new beginnings:

- Jesus had compassion and mercy for Bartimaeus who was considered 'less than' by others. However, if Bartimaeus hadn't been shouting out for mercy, this encounter may not have happened.
- Jesus enabled Bartimaeus to see the world with new eyes – to see and feel the world differently.

I wonder if our own experiences have been like those of Bartimaeus. Have you been able to experience God's compassion and mercy, or have you wanted to hide away the difficulties of life or mistakes that you have made? In April last year, when we were in the middle of the first lockdown, you may have found it easy to look at the world differently. Maybe you could experience aspects of nature that you couldn't normally (e.g., birdsong); you may have had opportunities to slow down (I did more walking); and you may have tried out something new (I got to grips with video recording and editing).

I wonder if you've been able to keep up with seeing people and the world differently since most of the restrictions on our interactions have been lifted. Maybe the second lockdown took away the openness of mind that you previously allowed in your interactions with others and in your experiences. I think that something of the

healing of Bartimaeus is available to us all, if we recognise that we need God's mercy and are open to what God might be wanting to show us. Our healing service in July came after services of lament and of recognising God with us. This reviewing of the past – of all the difficulties that we've faced and the times when God has shown us something different – helps in paving the way for healing to happen.

I pray that you will be able to recognise the pain and hurt in your experiences of the past 18 months and use them in seeing or feeling differently about something, so that this can be a new beginning for you.



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

Stories of God with us – Rowena Griffiths

Lockdown was tough – I won't pretend it wasn't.

There were times when it would have been so easy to give up and enter into a downward spiral. Reflecting on this I realise that something always happened during these times of doubt that pulled me back from the brink.

Could this be where God was alongside me?

I decided to 'shield' because of my weakened immune system and other health problems and so I can identify with those who have been shielding for months, some of whom are still not able to do much.

To start with all doctor and hospital appointments were cancelled. We relied on internet shopping, supplemented by my husband going to the store (often when the shelves were empty), presenting a number of worries about food, which is not good when you are diabetic. At times it was difficult to get any slots and we almost didn't have a Christmas dinner. I haven't seen any of my family since February 2020 due to travel restrictions, which is hard.

All these things have made it a very anxious time.

I was finally called up for an eye appointment, only to be told that my eyesight has deteriorated due to the lack of regular appointments. I am now due to have further treatment in the next few weeks to hopefully correct this.

So, what has kept me going?

To start with, Hazel asked me to help by sending out a weekly email with the Pew Sheets and other emails about events and meetings. We have met as a Ministry Team via Zoom to discuss and organise services, as well as to record them. I also receive the Morning Prayer reflections by email every day. We set up the Zoom Coffee and chat, which I continue to host, and this has been a lifeline for many. The Pastoral Care Team was extended, and we were all allocated a group of people to keep in touch with by phone or email. This is one of the main things that has kept me focused. Quite often, when I was feeling low, I would call someone on my list of contacts and my problems paled into insignificance when I listened to theirs. At other times some of them have called to ask how I am, which is really thoughtful. Perhaps this is how God is reaching out to me.

I am fortunate to have a garden and have spent many hours there during this pandemic. This is my sanctuary and where I feel God speaks to me. I have two plaques there which re-iterate this and say it all.

I don't know who wrote this first one:

*'The dawn of the morn for glory,
The hush of the night for peace,
In the garden at eve says the story,
God walks and his smile brings release.'*


The second one is from 'The Lord God Planted a Garden' by Dorothy Frances Gurney:




Calling ex-members of the 6th & 7th West Wickham Scout Groups

REHEMA TRUST: a charity supported by St Mary's

Rehema Trust was set up five years ago in memory of Jan Mason's sister, Barbara Leighton, to support the work of Barbara Academy, in Kenya.

The situation in Kenya has become more challenging recently, with rates of Covid-19 and deaths rising sharply, prompting further restrictions, including the closure of churches and an extension of the night-time curfew, but schools remain open. However, less than 3% of the population is fully vaccinated and there is limited access to health services. There are also increasing signs that climate change is disturbing the previously predictable weather patterns, which are critical to the subsistence farming, on which many in the local population rely. I am pleased to report that no Covid-19 cases have occurred at Barbara Academy so far, but sadly, one parent of a school pupil has died in recent weeks.

Barbara Academy opened at the end of July to start a new school year and has expanded with a further year group, who are occupying our latest new classroom. Thanks to Edward Wata (leader of the local project partner) and his team, Barbara Academy was granted Full Registration status in April by the Ministry of Education, but they will need to carry out suggested improvements over the next five years when there will be a review of this registration with implications for future funding requirements. Staff changes at Barbara Academy, including the appointment of a very experienced Head Teacher, have strengthened the Teaching Staff Team.

There is now stability in the current funding, allowing the trust to plan in the short term with greater confidence. However, the continued expansion to achieve full nursery & primary school status, plus the ongoing demands to maintain and improve the school facilities, is already placing pressure on the limited financial resources. If anyone

Finally, Edward Wata reports that the teachers have been pleased with how well the pupils have performed in recent months, given their disrupted education due to an extended school closure last year. This no doubt reflects the value of the extra resources, funded by donors including St Mary's, which helped to ensure that the teachers could support the pupils in their homes during this difficult time.

Thank you for continuing to make a real difference to many young lives in Kenya. Malcolm Leighton



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
