

LETTER FROM RICHARD

Dear Friends,

Since 1989, the Church has celebrated the period from September 1st to October 4th, as Creationtide, or as it's more often referred to now, the Season of Creation. It was a concept first introduced by the Ecumenical Patriarch of the Eastern Orthodox Church, Demetrios I, but now embraced by the Church of England and other denominations.

The importance of the Creation in Christian thinking can be found in, for example, Paul's comment in his letter to the Romans that "the whole of creation has been groaning in labour pains until now," (8. 22) and St Francis of Assisi's "Canticle of the Creatures," where we find the lines:

Praised be you, my Lord,

through our Sister Mother Earth,

who sustains and governs us,

and who produces various fruit

with coloured flowers and herbs.

Recently, however, I was struck by some words in the Genesis story of Creation, where, just after humankind has been created, we find:

Then God said, "I give you every seed-bearing plant on the face of the whole earth and every tree that has fruit with seed in it. They will be yours for food." (1.29)

No mention there, you'll notice, about us becoming carnivores!

About the same time as I read that, there was a leading article in "The Guardian" about the need for us to reduce the amount of processed and red meat that we eat. The "selfish" argument for this was that the regular eating of processed and red meat led to a greater risk of type 2 diabetes, added to the fact that they are also linked to an increased risk of cancer.

More important, perhaps, and certainly more relevant for our children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren is the fact that meat and dairy products are by far the most carbon-intensive of foods. In other words, they have an adverse impact on the environment.

The UK's Climate Change Committee, which advises the government on policies to reduce the damage being done to the planet, has proposed a 35% reduction in meat per person by 2050.

As Christians, we're called to be stewards of God's world. One of the ways in which we can exercise that stewardship is by considering what we eat. I'm not advocating the complete elimination of meat from our diets, although the words from Genesis quoted earlier suggest that that is an idea to which we should be giving serious consideration.

But what I am suggesting is that when we may feel overwhelmed by the problems of global warming and climate change and what we can do about them, reviewing and changing our diets is something that we can all do.

The verses that come next in the Genesis story read:

³⁰ And to all the beasts of the earth and all the birds in the sky and all the creatures that move along the ground—everything that has the breath of life in it—I give every green plant for food." And it was so.

³¹ God saw all that he had made, and it was very good.





In June, I was pleased to be able to inform the recently installed parish priest of St Andrew's, Tinashe Mahwerera, that St Francis had sent just under £2982.00 towards the construction of a parish rectory. At the same time, I asked whether he could send me some pictures of his installation as the incumbent.

This was his response:

Greetings and hoping I find you well.

Indeed we shall be praying for you. This coming Sunday service we shall put you again in our prayers during the service.

I shall indeed share with you pictures from the just ended induction service. My pleasure.

We are really grateful for the gift towards rectory construction. We really appreciate your love. May the Lord continue to bless you. Yes as of now we had not received it but as soon as we receive it I shall acknowledge.

However, it would appear that the money has yet to reach them, as I have just received a further email from Tinashe:

"Greetings, Richard, I do hope I find you well and blessed. We are now into the summer and the temperatures are on the high side. We are all praying that we have enough rains this season. Last season was so dry. At St Andrew's we have our Harvest Thanksgiving Day on the 29th September. This is a day of Thanksgiving, and we wish to use whatever we will get in the construction of our rectory. The rectory is still at ringbeam level, but we hope to raise something towards the next levels. The Diocese of Central Zimbabwe shall be celebrating its 43rd Anniversary on 5th October. We continue inviting your prayers. With Lord's blessings Rev Tinashe"

I'm sure that had our gift reached Zimbabwe, Tinashe would have acknowledged it. It's typical of the approach to building in Zimbabwe that they don't wait till they have the full cost of construction to hand, but rather start with what they have and add to the building as the money comes in. However, it must be frustrating for Tinashe that he has to commute some distance to his parish in the meantime. So let's pray that our money will soon reach St Andrew's and that they'll soon be able to complete the rectory.

Nature's cycle Of true surrender A process that starts In late September. Only the brave Can comprehend, As one life begins Another must end.


It would be odd, If, when April comes This final leaf Was still hanging on. Letting go has taught it An invaluable lesson, Sacrificing its life For the next generation.






